President's Report

What a great start to the Melbourne Camera Club's new year... our oldest member Alan Elliot awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for his outstanding services to photography. (See page 3)

Congratulations Alan. And congratulations on your 2012 Queenie Gatt award. What an inspiration you are ... still kicking goals at 91.

As our club approaches its 125th year (2016), it's timely to remember the old truism: "The only constant is change".

At the suggestion of new board member and marketing guru Jens Karnoe, a member survey was conducted during the Christmas/New Year break. Comments and suggestions were invited regarding, among other things, what changes we could make to keep the MCC relevant and interesting to today's new generation of digital camera users.

Thanks to the 131 members who submitted responses the board now has lots of interesting comments to consider. Here are some of the most interesting findings:

To the question: What new offerings would you like from the MCC? ... the top four were:

1. Lightroom/Photoshop and other post processing demonstrations

2. Practical photo-tours/expeditions.

3.Practical demonstrations, for example: lens focus checking, adjustments and sensor cleaning.

4. An intermediate photography course

This accords with what I'm hearing from other camera clubs, i.e., that there is a widespread desire for more emphasis on practical, how to workshops and other demonstration oriented programs.

To the question: What are your favourite types of photography? ... the top 3 were:

- 1. Landscape
- 2. Travel
- 3. Portrait

Some of the most frequently made comments about the club were:

"We need more young members"

Only one of the survey respondents was under the age of 25, whereas 69% of our members are aged between 36 and 75. (Could it be that the MCC has an image problem in the eyes of young people? If it does, we need to do something about it.)

"We need more female members" (survey shows we're 76% male, 24% female.)

"We should start our meetings on time" (some are even suggesting that we should start them at 7.45 or 7.30.)

"We should have more outings" (some are suggesting we have some weekend excursions, including overnight stays.) "The MCC's website needs updating".

"More opportunity to have our photos critiqued by experienced members".

Now it's up to the board to find the best way to deliver on the various desires and suggestions put forward by MCC members, as part of the survey.

It has already held a full day reviewing the survey results and formulating broad strategies for the future. We look forward to sharing more with you in the near future, when we have developed concrete action plans. Meanwhile (and at any time) please feel free to put forward your thoughts and suggestions to any MCC board member or office bearer.

I would like to extend a special thanks to Jens Karnoe for preparing, conducting and providing the findings of this important survey. Well done.

By the time you're reading this issue of Exposure our next Introduction to Photography Course will be getting under way. This is an incredibly popular club initiative which is usually oversubscribed ... it was again this time around.

If you are a club member with lots of experience under your belt, your attendance at these sessions as a "helper" would be appreciated. After each evening session there are typically more people asking questions than there are presenters on hand to answer them. The more we can satisfy the course participants' thirst for new knowledge, the more likely we are to win them over as new members and enthusiastic club ambassadors.

The course runs over six Tuesday evenings starting on February 5th through to March 12th. There are also three Sunday morning practical sessions; Feb 10th, 17th and March 3rd. As well as contributing as a helper, it's likely that you'll also learn a few new tricks yourself ... I usually do.

few new tricks yourself ... I usually do. Our 5 minute "show and tell" segments at the start of meetings (except print nights) are proving very popular with members. As well as being of interest to the members by showing them what we've been shooting lately, presenters have the opportunity to gain valuable member feedback.

Don't be shy. If you've been shooting interesting stuff lately, we'd like to see it. Show us as many images as you like, ideally 20 or so, but for a strict total presentation time of 5 minutes, or 300 seconds, whichever occurs first. 

Melbourne Camera Club's "Photography is Fun" Trophy - The Bockey and Best Print Essay Jane Clancy Communication Changes



This award, instigated by Ross Penny, is given to the maker of the photograph which the judge considers the maker had most fun producing.

Again, this year, the judging was not an easy task but I looked for a photograph that I would most enjoy making.

There were a number of contenders but Jane Clancy's was finally selected.

It was a triptych showing the changes in the mechanics of written communication over the last century.

In each image an example of the message is included and, whilst I am generally not in favour of text in a photograph as the viewer always try to read it, in this case there is so much text that the viewer accepts it as part of the image.


Is this a case of more is less? More text is less intrusive?

The post-production treatment is well done and gives each image an atmosphere pertinent to the period and also reduces the need to read the text.

Overall, as well as the tasks of capture and post-production, this photograph required significant planning after the initial idea was conceived.
