Ballarat is a comfortable 90-minute drive from Melbourne via the Western Highway (one hour from Melbourne Airport). There's plenty of street parking within walking distance of the Festival Hub. Trains and buses run frequently every day from Melbourne and Geelong. The Festival Hub is a short 2-minute walk from the Ballarat Train Station. Once in Ballarat, you'll find indoor and outdoor photography and festival events in Lydiard Street and surrounds, rain, hail or shine.

Platon (GBR/USA) People Power – Platon

People Power — Platon is an exhibition of arresting portraits of some of the most significant people of our time. From the cool gaze of Putin to the contortion of Gaddafi, the art and expression of Vivienne Westwood, the influence of Yoko Ono, the dynamism of Prince, the courage of Michelle Obama, the power of Adele, the striking features of Cate Blanchett, the memorable Kevin Rudd and his campaigns, the rebellion of Pussy Riot - Platon's work is powerful.

Platon's iconic work has featured on the covers and pages of global magazines including George, Vanity Fair, GQ, Vogue, The New York Times, and Sunday Times Magazine. Platon has photographed more than thirty covers for *Time* magazine including Russian President Vladimir Putin for Time's Person of The Year in 2007. Since then his portrait of Putin has become a symbol of resistance for those fighting for rights in Russia.

Platon's graphic, often granular style comes from a strong sense of design and has been shaped through his early years watching his architect father draw buildings in Greece. He makes us aware of both presence and absence with images that immerse us in a narrative that moves us to empathy, reminding us that in spite of our differences, we share the capacity to be human.

In 2008, Platon signed on as staff photographer to *The New* Yorker and produced a number of portfolios for the magazine focused on various themes: the U.S Military, portraits of world leaders and the Civil Rights Movement.

In 2013, Platon founded the not-for-profit organisation *The* People's Portfolio to document humanitarian efforts around the world. His portfolios include photographs of Burmese victims and exiles, Egyptian revolutionaries, and those fighting against oppression in Russia.

Platon is currently on the board for Arts and Culture at the World Economic Forum and serves as a steward for the Economic Growth and Social Inclusion Initiative.



Andy Warhol (USA) Instant Warhol

Instant Warhol takes us straight to Andy Warhol's point of view, famous, fleeting, commercialised, constructed, in a series of his Polaroid photographs of people in the spotlight in the '70s and '80s. This amazing collection from The Brant Foundation in New York shows us Warhol's understanding of the superficial nature of celebrity in American society, his obsession with the people behind the personas, and the fleeting nature of fame.

Many of the 59 images show the line and expression of famous faces including Mick Jagger, Liza Minelli, Jean-Michel Basquiat, Jane Fonda and Dolly Parton. Many of these would later be translated into Warhol's iconic screen prints.

The instant nature of Polaroid pictures was a fuel that drove Warhol's exhaustive survey of the world he lived in from 1958 to 1987. From the 70s he used the Big Shot, a Polaroid camera with a rigid body designed for portraits, with a fixed focal distance, which meant the photographer had to physically move backwards and forwards to focus the frame.

In his self-portrait Polaroids, Warhol often exaggerated, transformed, or disguised himself so that the images became caricatures of his real face. Instant Warhol includes some of the last series of self-portraits of Warhol before his death in 1987.

Instant Warhol is a fascinating social document of a time when celebrity, art world grittiness, New York, the Factory, Studio 54 and an expanding media scape were reimagining art, music, and popular culture.

Yvonne Todd (NZL) The Stephanie Collection

Yvonne Todd's photographs can make you look twice. There is something not quite right - a discomfort, an awkward experience.

This New Zealand based photographer is known for her unique and unconventional approach to portraiture. Her work challenges photographic clichés by manipulating traditional photographic styles to create unexpected and provocative relationships. Her unsettling images feature objects or characters in striking costumes and unnatural poses. Their unfathomable glossy complexions can appear doll-like or with a hint of ghoulishness: wigs, fake teeth, and prosthetics are highly styled and manipulated.

Todd's work is not a commentary on beauty, but rather an exploration of the irreverent and obscure. Her distinctive approach to photography has earned her a reputation as a standout figure in the New Zealand art scene and a significant contributor to contemporary art.

Erik Johansson (SWE) How to Fly

Experience the surreal landscapes of Swedish artist Erik Johansson, in this Australian exclusive exhibition at the Ballarat Mining Exchange. *How To Fly* is a journey through the imaginary worlds he creates that seem almost real but are a composite of many images.

Johansson combines photographic elements to create believable images, but the logical inconsistencies make us question what we see. Influenced by his childhood memories of the Swedish countryside, Johansson's work incorporates Nordic nature, wide open landscapes, and small red houses.

There are no computer generated, illustrated or stock photos in Johansson's artworks, just seamless combinations of his own photographs. It is a long process, and he only creates eight new images per year. With a keen eye for detail and mastery of production, his optical illusions present inner worlds that defy reality.



Kyle Archie Knight (AUS) Cruising for a Bruising

Kyle Archie Knight's *Cruising for a Bruising* is a camp love letter to the Australian Suburbs. Growing up queer in outer-metropolitan Naarm (Melbourne), Knight found themselves drawn to explore the streets of their family neighbourhood. Their search for moments that capture the essence of suburbia result in a celebration of the surreal and the mundane, the humorous and the humdrum.

The exhibition and Knight's debut photobook delve into family archives, alongside memories of suburbia and growing pains experienced over the years. As a flâneur, Knight reconnects with past memories of estrangement, finding humour in what was once cold while expressing a lighter side of suburban Australia.

Jeff Moorfoot OAM, founding father of the Ballarat International Foto Biennale (2005 – 2015), returns to curate *The Real Thing* – a milestone exhibition for the Biennale's 10th edition. Fifteen regional Victorian photographers respond to the festival theme *The Real Thing* and Russell Morris's 1969 song of the same name, which presented an incongruity to the complex production values and song length of more than double the length of most singles of the day.

Featuring highly credentialed artists working in a range of genres including fine art, photojournalism, commercial, documentary, and old processes, *The Real Thing* celebrates the expertise and thriving communities of practising photographers in regional Victoria.

It is a catalogue of everything that can go wrong in photography, featuring double-exposures, light leaks, X-ray clouding, and corrupted computer files.

Despite unintended damage to his images, Dupont finds spectacular beauty within the frame. This exhibition is a celebration of the accidental, the unpredictable, and the imperfect, returning to the primal magic of photography and its ability to capture something beyond intent. *Fucked Up Fotos* is a showcase of the unexpected and the remarkable in the most unlikely places, a meditation on chance and the power of photography to capture the unforeseen.
